The Special Education Bureau (SEB) of the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) conducts meetings with Local Education Agency (LEA) Special Education Directors, Regional Educational Cooperatives (RECs), and Charter Schools three times per year. One purpose of the meetings is to gather input on the professional development, technical assistance, transition planning, etc. needs of the LEAs as it pertains to the distribution of funds under Other State-level Activities.

In addition, the allocation of Other State-Level Activities is determined by an analysis of the State Performance Plan (SPP) data and the identification root causes for missing the Indicators. Additional improvement activities are identified and funded through the other State-Level Activities. The New Mexico State IDEA Advisory Panel also gave input on the improvement activities at its meeting on December 3, 2009.

On February 24, 2010, a broad stakeholder’s meeting was held to gather input on the State’s annual application. The stakeholder group was comprised of LEAs, RECs, Charter Schools, parents, advocates, and contractors. The State application was posted on the SEB’s website for 60 days beginning March 1, 2010. Public comment on the State’s application was accepted from March 1 – 30, 2010. Stakeholders across the State were notified of the posting and public comment period via a press release and email.
